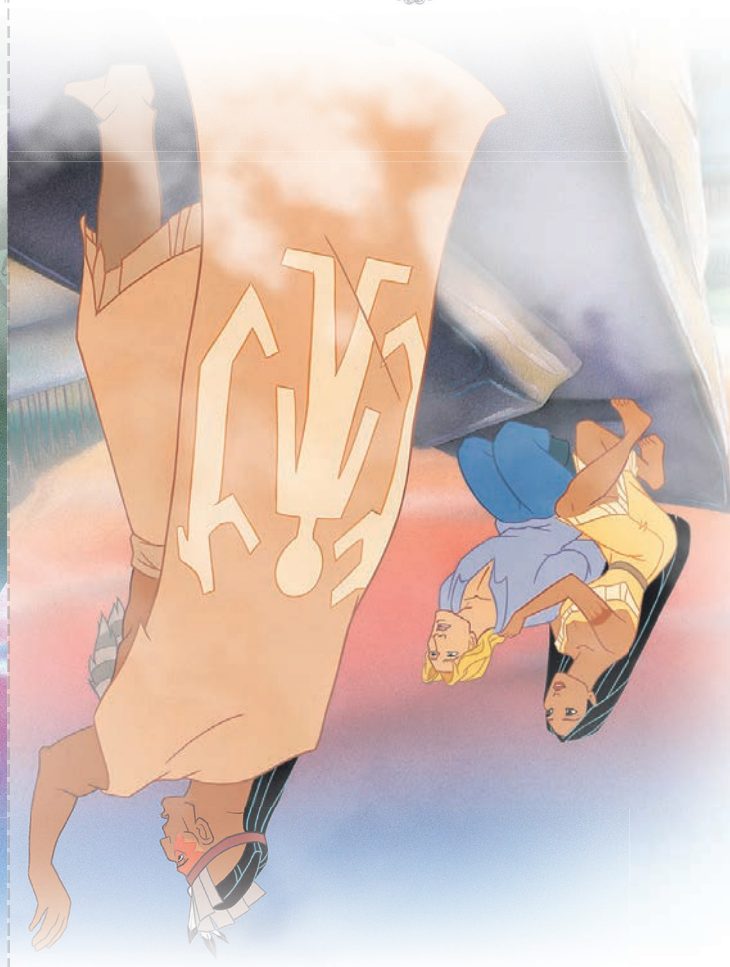
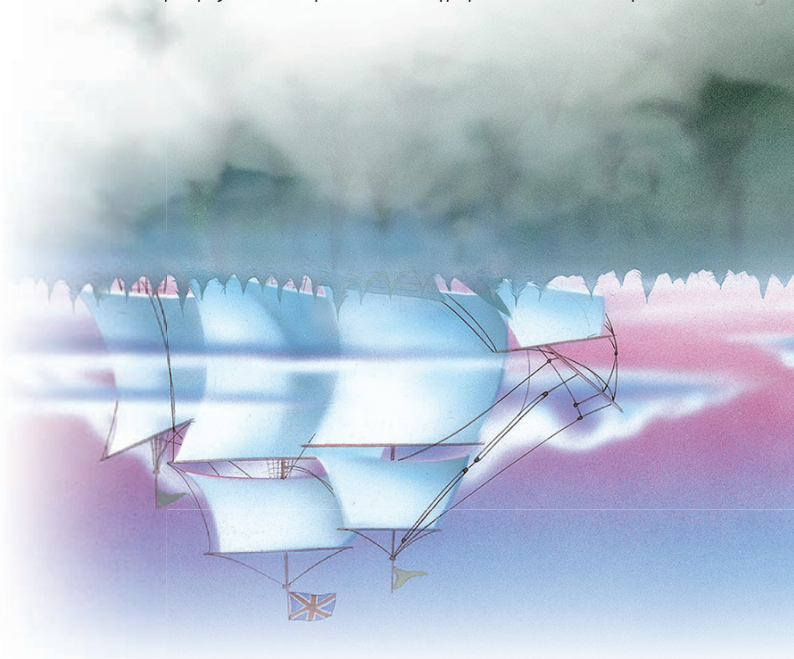

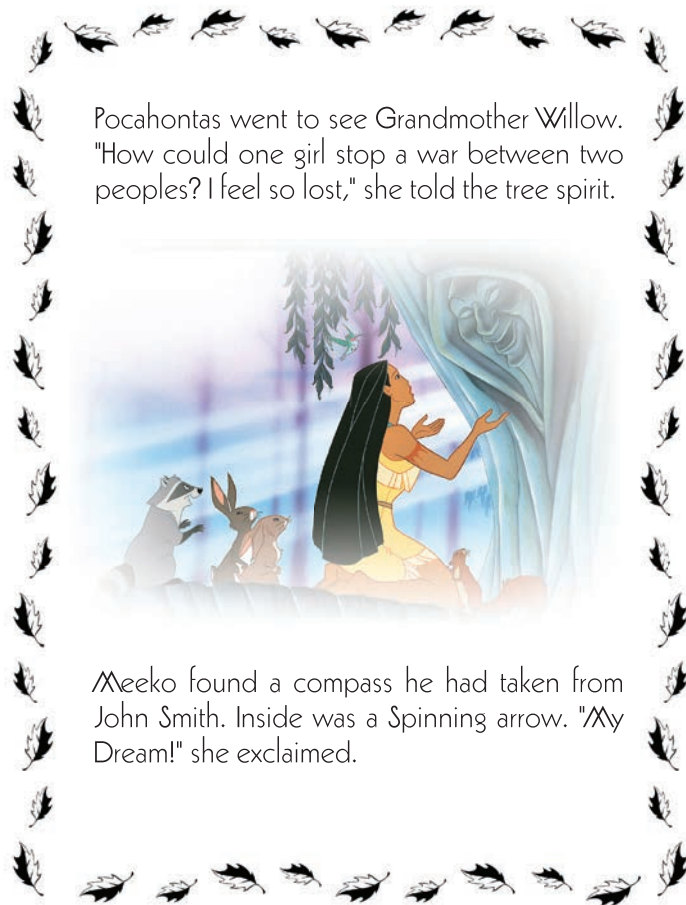
Climbing to a hilltop, Pocahontas felt the wind and saw strange white clouds. The clouds were sails of a ship with strangers coming to her land.
